Five Days, Five Calls to Action

Each day we will highlight a different ask to secure the future of the youth work sector using #InvestInYouthWork #YWW23

Monday 6th - A right to youth work – young people have the right to access youth work as an essential part of their education.

Tuesday 7th - Increased investment – investing in youth work is an investment in Scotland's young people and needs to be our top priority.

Wednesday 8th - Access to spaces – ensure youth work has a right to access the school estate as part of our education system, and find a long-term solution to the lack of access to indoor community spaces.

Thursday 9th - Policy guarantee – the role of youth work written into the strategies and policies of local and national government.

Friday 10th - Workforce for the future - Investment in the youth work workforce, paid and volunteer, to halt the decline in quality youth work services for young people.


